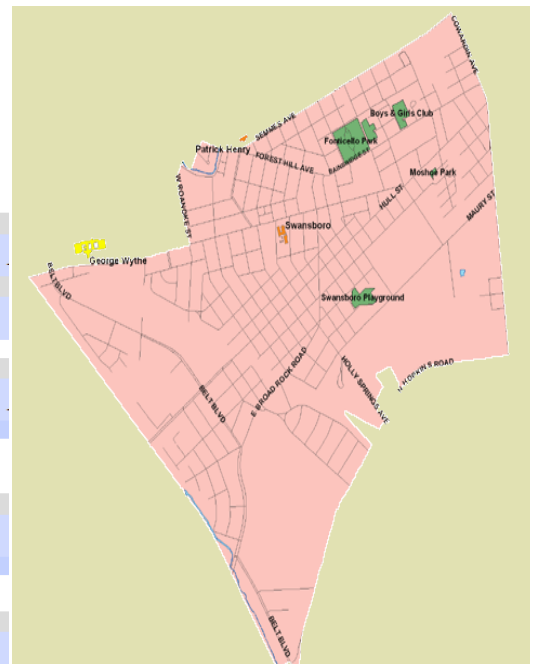

***The most common crime in the city is theft from unlocked motor vehicles— PLEASE LOCK YOUR CARS!***

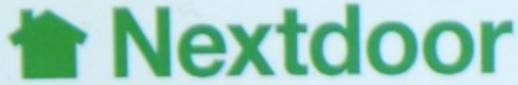

- Mark or slash inspection stickers and city decals
- Put valuables in the trunk
- Do not use your glove box as a 'safe'
- Do not leave coins in plain view









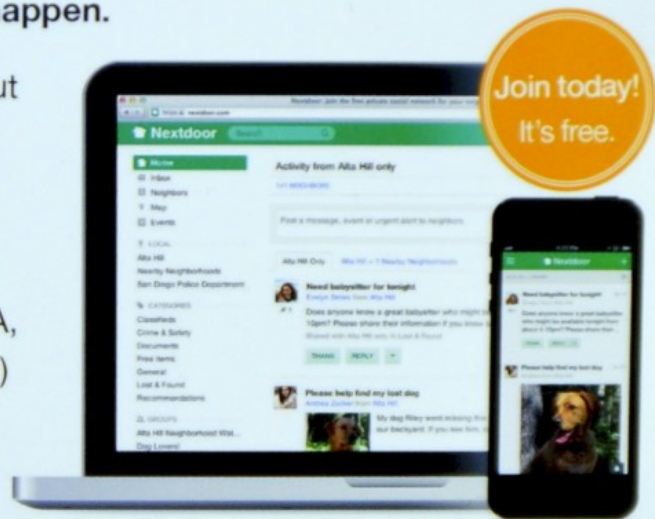
