Caprichia Smith Spellman is Named OCWB's New Director

Senior Nonprofit and Public Sector Leader Caprichia Spellman is the Office of Community Wealth Building's new Director.

"She served the department well as its Interim Director during a complex period of transition," affirms the City's Deputy Chief Administrative Officer of Human Services, Reggie Gordon.

Mrs. Spellman originally joined OCWB as the Economic and Community Development Administrator where she provided oversight for the Workforce Development program and Career Stations that serve 18,000 residents each year.

"My success in both roles truly reflects the team's creativity, efforts, resilience, and talent," says Mrs. Spellman.

OCWB has a New Director, contd.

Caprichia empowered OCWB staff to continue providing service delivery of workforce services during the pandemic. They expanded the network of training providers to create pathways for in-demand careers in industries such as cybersecurity, solar power, carpentry, and energy applying non-traditional methods of instruction when necessary. In addition, the team worked to increase and diversify virtual workforce session offerings. They also implemented new ways to improve access to services for residents in partnership with the City's Ambassadors and the Richmond Public Libraries, especially those impacted by the digital divide.

Mrs. Spellman obtained a Bachelor of Arts in Interdisciplinary Studies from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University (VA Tech) and earned a Master of Divinity from the Samuel DeWitt Proctor School of Theology at Virginia Union University.

Caprichia's greatest passions are guiding the professional development of staff, mentoring people, and working alongside team members on issues of equity and economic mobility.

"I am looking forward to inspiring workforce innovation and systems change that will reduce the impact of poverty on Richmond's residents," says Mrs. Spellman.

From Computer Programmer to Social Worker: Meet Kenechukwu "Kene" Menakaya



Kenechukwu "Kene" Menakaya relocated to Maryland from Lagos, Nigeria, in 2009 to work for a software company as a Computer Programmer. However, when Mr. Menakaya arrived, he discovered that the company had closed. As a result, he suddenly became unemployed and worked several part-time, lower-paying jobs to make ends meet: Certified Nursing Aide (CNA) and Ice-cream Shop Associate. Finally, however, Mr. Menakaya aspired to do more in his career.

In 2016, Mr. Menakaya came to OCWB's workforce program to receive commercial driving and phlebotomy training. In addition, he attended soft skills workshops and created an individual career plan with his Career Advisor. Shortly after completing his training, he secured a job as a Mobile Bus Driver for the American Red Cross, where he drew blood for residents in the community. After gaining experience in the healthcare industry, he decided to go to the school to become a Social Worker. Mr. Menakaya graduated from Walden University on November 14, 2021. with his Masters in Social Work from Walden University and a concentration in Advanced Clinical Studies. He hopes to be a Social Worker for the Veteran's hospital one day. Mr. Menekaya also reported that he is a newlywed!

"Everybody should strive very hard to get to the top and go wherever you want to go," says Kenechukwu "Kene" Menakaya.


