How To Protect Your Pipes from Fats, Oils and Grease

With the cooler season amongst us, there's nothing more comforting this time of year than cooking up warm, hearty meals. However, these dishes often produce more fats, oils and grease, which can be difficult to manage. Proper disposal and handling of FOG is essential to keep your home and local plumbing system running smoother. Utilize these tips to protect your pipes:

Store Grease in A Container

Use a metal, glass or plastic container to store leftover grease. Allow the grease to cool before storing, then throw the container into the trash once it is full.



Wipe Before You Wash

Wipe off greasy pans with a paper towel before washing to reduce the amount of grease going down the drain and prevent drainage issues.



Protect Your Drains

Use strainers or mesh screens over sink drains to catch food scraps and solid debris.

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Affordable Tools to Weatherize Your Home on A Budget

Prepping your home for the colder seasons doesn't have to break the bank. These budget friendly solutions will help you save energy and stay warm all season long. Visit rva.gov/public-utilites/news for more tips.

Door Sweeps

Prices range from \$9 to \$17 depending on the type and material.

(4) Window Insulation

Prices range from \$7 to \$15. with variations based on size and brand.

LED Light Bulb

Prices for a single LED bulb range from \$2 to \$6. Weather Stripping

Foam strips are \$5 and can go up to ≥ \$15 for materials like silicone or rubber.

Water Tank Cover

Prices range from \$20 to \$40 based on the material and thickness.

Furnace Filter

Depending on size and MERV rating, prices range from **\$10 to \$25** for a single filter.

Caulking

A standard tube is approx. \$3 to \$8, depending on the brand and type.

Outlet Covers

Prices range from \$3 to \$7 for a pack.

Stairway Attic Cover

Prices range from \$50 to **\$150**, based on the level of insulation and size.

DPU and YOU! Let's Get the Lead Out!

The Department of Public Utilities met the October federal deadline to submit an inventory map that identifies the material of all water service lines in the City of Richmond. This inventory is required as part of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Lead and Cooper Rule Revisions and helps municipalities create a plan to replace all lead pipes by the newly passed deadline of 2037.

DPU has published this interactive map and needs the help of customers. We invite you to visit the map to determine whether a survey is requested for your property. Customers at properties with service lines that are unknown or confirmed lead or galvanized will receive annual notification letters beginning this November as required.





We remind citizens that eliminating the risk of lead getting into drinking water is a shared responsibility. Richmond's drinking water does not contain lead when it leaves the treatment plant. Rather, instances of lead in water can occur from water service lines made of lead as well as internal plumbing materials. A portion of each water service line is owned by the City (public), and a portion is owned by the property owner (private).
